7.3 Indicative Module Content, Organisation and Structure

The aim of this core module is to provide the learner with a more specialised and contemporary understanding of social psychology. The learner will develop the skills necessary to evaluate a piece of social psychology research and to assess the strengths and weaknesses of social psychology theories. These skills will enable the learner to evaluate contemporary research being conducted by social psychologists in the areas that will be covered in the module (i.e. cultural evolution, social self, social structures, social reasoning, limits of adaption).

Over the course of 12 weeks, the learner will cover a range of topics such as (but not exclusively),

7.6 Application of programme teaching, learning and assessment strategies to this module

This module will be delivered over 12 weeks, which consists of lectures (12) and tutorials (each learner will have 4 tutorials). The lecturer and tutor utilise research informed theories, analysis and critique in delivering the content. Tutorials provide an opportunity for learners to engage in discussion and develop their critical thinking and research skills. Group work in tutorials also provides opportunity to apply psychological theories and research to real world scenarios.

Assessments for this module consist of 2500-word essay worth 80%- and discussion board worth 20%.

Essay: The essay (weighted at 80%) will be an assignment to examine learners' research, academic writing, and referencing skills. Learners have the opportunity to demonstrate understanding of material and ability to compare, contrast and critique psychological theories (MIMLOs 1, 2, 4, 5).

Discussion Board: The discussion board (weighted at 20%) involves contributing to a Moodle Discussion Board, where learners will evaluate the theories and findings presented in the journal articles. The assignment maps onto the minimum intended module learning outcomes (2, 3). The assignment allows learners to demonstrate their understanding of the core concepts, psychological theories and research studied in the course. This form of assessment encourages learners to describe, compare and critique the core psychological theories related to child developmental psychology to showcase their learning and understanding (MIMLOs 2, 3).
