

Getting Started

To get started you will need:

- 1) **Your Learner ID**: This card is required to borrow books from the library.
- 2) Your CCSP Login credentials: This is your college email address and password, it's needed for logging onto library computers, and for printing and photocopying (cost per page: 10c black & white, 20c colour).
- 3) **Student Number and Pin:** Required to access some online content and your <u>Library Account.</u> Your PIN will be issued when you register with the library.
- 4) **Library Staff:** We are always here to help, so feel free to drop by the library desk!

You will also need to access your **Library Account** to:

- Check how many books you have out and when they need to be returned
- Renew your books online
- Reserve a book for borrowing
- Access some of our online content

Borrowing / Bookshop

For borrowing rules, please see our webpage. First to third-year students can borrow up to 3 books, and fourth-year students up to 5.

We offer **Click & Collect** for print books, and you can also browse the shelves in the library.

Our bookshop service allows you to order and purchase course materials. A deposit is required; requests can be made at the **Library Desk** or via email: librarycc@carlowcollege.ie.

There is a **self-service desk** in the library where you can issue, renew, and return books. You will need your Learner ID to use this service.

Moodle - Virtual Learning Environment

Moodle is the virtual learning environment used by Carlow College. It is a web-based application where you can access your lecture PowerPoints, course notes, other learning materials, information, resources and supports. You can also communicate with your lecturer and other students.

To login to Moodle you will need your student number as it appears on your student card and your account password.

Moodle is organised into specific sections by programme (course) and stage (year). Once you are enrolled in your modules, you will have access to your learning material and resources.

You can access Moodle from home or college. Just connect to the internet, go to the Student Portal on Carlow College website www.carlowcollege.ie and click on the Moodle tab at the top of the page. Enter your username and password.

An introduction to Moodle and how to gain access to your modules will be provided during orientation. You can also contact IT at itsupport@carlowcollege.ie for support and assistance gaining access

MS Office 365

Microsoft 365 is a bundle of software that provides Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Team, OneDrive, Outlook (email) and more. To access M365 go to either https://www.office.com/ or the Student Portal on Carlow College website www.carlowcollege.ie

Use your Carlow College email address and your password to login. These will be given to you once you have completed the registration process.

Microsoft 365 can be used on PCs, Macs, tablets and smartphones in a browser, and is installed on all Carlow College machines.





MS Teams

Integrated with MS Office 365, MS Teams is a communication and collaboration platform, which among other things allows live chats and video conferencing. It also creates an interactive online classroom for learning.








Advice from our Careers Officer Eleanor Kehoe

The majority of students in Higher Education today have made their study choices based on a desire to enhance their future career prospects. The good news is that recent research studies show the value of having a degree continues to be significant over the course of your working life with Irish graduates typically earning upwards of €200,000 more than non-graduates. Higher education qualifications not only attract a significant economic premium but also would appear to impact positively on job and career satisfaction, according to annual HEA Graduate Outcomes Surveys (check out the Careers Office Moodle site for more information).

Students who focus on building their employability skills throughout their time at college have a distinct advantage in the graduate labour market.

Focus on achieving good academic grades. That's your number one priority as a student, work as well as you can, take advantage of the supports that are available to you, plan, prepare, strategise and meet your deadlines, communicate with college staff and friends if you are having any difficulties and celebrate success along the way. Proactive, effective communication is the top employability skill across all sectors.

Carlow is on the main Dublin to Waterford M9 route, approximately 1.5 hours' drive from Dublin and an hour from Waterford. Our pedestrian entrance is located on College Street and our car-parking entrance is located on Old Dublin Road. The College has ample parking on campus. Eircode R93 A003.











What should I bring on the first day?

Bring a notebook and pens, so you can take note of important information. A refillable water bottle, there is a water station on site.

Where will I go when I arrive?

When you enter through the main entrance at the front of the building, staff and our student ambassadors will be there to direct you to where you need to go.

What happens during Orientation and Induction?

The orientation and induction process for new students takes place over several weeks as you settle into college. It starts with an on-campus day where you will have an opportunity to meet your Programme Director, Academic Advisor, LIRO and other college staff. You will also get your programme timetable and assessment schedule. There are also lots of opportunities to get to know your classmates, college staff, the Students' Union Team and the layout of the college itself.

The first year orientation and induction timetable is available on the **Student Portal**.

How long will it last?

First year orientation and in-person registration usually takes place over one day. Timetables are on the Student Portal. Orientation is a busy time - make sure to check the correct date and time to attend for your degree programme!

Will there be breaks?

Yes, you'll get breaks throughout the day with complimentary tea/coffee and biscuits available to keep you going!

Do I need money?

You'll need to bring money if you want to buy additional food or drinks. There's a subsidised dining hall on campus and many eateries in town. You can also bring your own food and eat it in the dining hall. You might also need money for transport. On-campus parking is free for the first few days, but access barriers will be in place from **Monday, 29 September 2025.**

I have mobility difficulties or other disabilityrelated requirements. Do I need to let anyone know in advance?

Yes, it would be useful for us to know in advance. You will receive a link to the relevant form as part of your online registration information. Please make sure to complete it if you need to or contact Caroline Flinter: academicresource@carlowcollege.ie.

I don't know anyone. I'm worried I won't make friends.

Coming to college is a new experience. This could be your first time away from home, leaving your friends and everything that is familiar. This is a new experience for everyone, so don't think that you're the only person who is either homesick or worried about not making friends! Embrace this new chapter, part of the fun of orientation is getting to meet new people, not only in your course but across all the programmes and you will find you will make many friend groups throughout your time at Carlow College.

Active*Consent Workshop

The Active* Consent Online Workshop is specially designed for third level students. To date, it has been deliv ered to 17,000+ students in 22 Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) across Ireland.

In collaboration with NUIG, Maura our College Nurse leads the workshop along with Student Union Officers. The workshop is 30 minutes long and provides a sex-positive safe space where you can explore the nuances of sexual consent and learn how to practice active consent with partners for more mutually enjoyable sexual experiences.

There is no active participation required during the online workshop but you can contribute anonymously to a poll using your mobile if you would like to. The workshop will be delivered during your induction and is a safe space that you can use to learn about active consent.



Getting Familiar With The Terms We Use

When starting College, you will hear a lot of terms that may not be familiar to you. These explanations might help you understand them a little better!

Programme Director: This is the person who has overall responsibility for the management of your degree programme.

Academic Advisor: An Academic Advisor is assigned to each stage of a programme. Their role is to meet with students to discuss queries relating to academic performance, requests for extensions on submissions and to provide information on the selection of appropriate modules, programme pathways, and related aspects of the educational experience.

Programme: This is your course. For example, Arts and Humanities; English and History, Professional Social Care, Psychology or Social, Political and Community Studies.

Stage: This is your year of study. For example, stage one = year one; stage two = year two etc.

Module: A subject or a number of subjects that make up your programme.

Module Code: The code number allocated to a specific module. The module code will generally be used as a short way of identifying the module.

Module Title: The full name of the module.

Credits: Each module carries a number of credits (on average 5) and you are expected to complete enough modules in a year to amount to 60 credits. This would mean taking 12 modules in a year or 6 per semester.

ECTS: European Credit Transfer Scheme. This is a standard for comparing the attainment and performance of students across the European Union. ECTS credits are awarded for modules that are completed successfully. One academic year corresponds to 60 ECTS (usually 12 modules x 5 credits).

Core Modules: These are compulsory modules which you must complete as part of your programme.

Elective Modules: Usually called 'electives' these are modules that you can choose to study as part of your programme. Some programmes provide a list of modules, from which you must choose a certain number along with the core modules to make up the required 60 credits for one year.

Discipline: This refers to a subject area that you will study. For example, Philosophy; Sociology; Theology; Psychology etc.

Semester: There are two blocks of 20 weeks in a year (including inductions/orientations, 12 weeks of classes followed by examinations/ final assessments). These are called semesters and there are examinations or final written assessments at the end of each semester. Usually modules are only delivered over one semester (Semester 1 or Semester 2) but some can be delivered over both.





Moodle: Moodle is the virtual learning environment used by Carlow College. It is a web-based application where you can access your lecture PowerPoints, course notes, other learning materials, information, resources and supports.

Module Enrolment Code: To access your module materials on Moodle you must first enrol on each module by inserting the relevant code. These codes are available on your Programme Moodle page. You need only enrol once.

Undergraduate: A college student who has not yet received a first degree (Bachelor's Degree).

Graduate: A student who has received an academic degree or diploma.

Postgraduate: A student who continues studies after graduation.

QQI: Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) oversees the development, recognition and awarding of academic qualifications.

Dissertation: A major piece of written work or research project undertaken in the final year of an undergraduate honours degree programme.

Good To Know

Where to find us: Carlow College, St. Patrick's campus is in the heart of Carlow town, just a two-minute walk from Tullow Street. Carlow is one of Ireland's largest inland towns located in the sunny south-east on the banks of the River Barrow where students can experience exhilarating outdoor adventure, vibrant nightlife and a rich cultural heritage. Carlow is well serviced by road and rail links to major Irish cities and towns and is approximately 80km from Dublin Airport.

Car: Carlow is on the main Dublin to Waterford M9 route, approximately 1.5 hours' drive from Dublin and an hour from Waterford. Our pedestrian entrance is located on College Street and our car-parking entrance is located on the Old Dublin Road. The College has ample car-parking on campus.

Bus & Coach: Carlow Bus Station is approx. 10 minutes (on foot) from the College. Bus & Coach services to and from Dublin, Waterford, Kilkenny, Wexford and surrounding counties operate daily from Carlow.

Train: Carlow railway station is approx. 5 minutes (on foot) from the College. There are direct links between

Carlow, Dublin and Waterford. The journey from Carlow to Dublin takes approx. 1 hour and there are also direct links to Waterford and other counties.

College WiFi: Network: Carlow College WiFi. The password will be provided at orientation.

Entry to Main College Building: All entry points to the main college building are via electronic doors. Once registered you will need to swipe your student card to gain entry. You won't need a card to gain entry for the first couple of weeks. Automatic doors will be in operation from **Monday, 29th September 2025**.

Parking for Cars, Bicycles & Scooters: There are plenty of spaces and you can park anywhere (except the staff carpark!). To enter the car parks, just swipe your student card to raise the barrier. When leaving the car park, the exit barrier will lift automatically. Barriers will remain open for the first couple of weeks until everyone settles in.

The car parking fee is €30 per academic year. If you wish to avail of the car park, please call to Reception to complete a Car Park Form, and pay the fee no later than Friday, 26th September 2025. Barriers will be in operation from Monday, 29th September 2025.

There are two designated areas to leave your bicycle / scooter in the car parking areas. Bicycles / scooters are not permitted inside college buildings.

Good To Know

Smoking / Vaping: All Students are requested to use the designated smoking area located in the South Wing carpark, adjacent to the Student Resource Building. This is the only designated smoking / vaping area for Carlow College Students. Students are asked to refrain from smoking / vaping elsewhere on the College campus. While cigarette bins are provided in the vicinity of the main entrance, it does not mean smoking is allowed! The bins are provided for smokers to dispose of cigarette butts as they approach the building. Smokers are kindly requested to use the designated smoking / vaping area.


Lecture Halls: Food and drink are not permitted in lecture halls.

Waste Management: There are two Waste Stations on campus, one on the O'Meara Gallery and one in the Carlovian Dining Hall. These waste stations facilitate recycling and general waste. Please do not leave rubbish behind you, bring it to one of the waste stations and place it in the relevant bin. Students are encouraged to assist with recycling in the College.

Lockers: Lockers are available in South Wing, adjacent to the Academic Administration Office. Lockers are for temporary storage on a day-to-day basis, and items cannot be left in lockers overnight. The personalisation of lockers is not permitted. Students can bring their own lock and key to secure a locker. The College is not responsible for items placed in lockers. The College reserves the right to inspect lockers.

Fire Safety: Familiarise yourself with the evacuation route. There are notices throughout the building. In the event of a fire alarm activation, evacuate the building immediately and in an orderly manner. Do not tamper with any fire equipment: door closers, window restrictors, fire extinguishers, detectors or break glasses. All students are expected to co-operate fully with fire drills.
