

A student contribution (registration) fee of €3,000 is payable by all students who do not qualify for a grant or scholarship for most of our undergraduate programmes.

However, our B.A. (Hons) in Psychology (PC414) is not funded by the Department of Education at present, and therefore, is subject to annual programme fees of €5250 + PEL (which includes the student contribution fee) with no grant funding available.

Students with **Disabilities & Learning Differences**

Carlow College is **not** part of the Disability Access Route to Education (DARE). However, our disability service is supported by the Fund for Students with Disabilities (FSD). We offer a full range of free academic supports to our students with disabilities, learning differences and long-term health conditions through our Academic Resource Office.

Academic Resource Office

Why did you choose Carlow College?

Why did you choose Carlow College?



QQI FET **Entry**

Carlow College offers entry routes to first year of undergraduate degree courses for students who have achieved a relevant QQI Level 5 award.

Application Process

All applications for admission under the QQI entry pathway must be made through the CAO at <u>www.cao.ie</u>

Minimum Entry Requirements

Ordinary Degree (Level 7): a full QQI-FET (Level 5 or 6) award with a minimum FE grade equivalent of 178 CAO points.

Honours Degree (Level 8): a full QQI-FET (Level 5 or 6) award with a minimum FE grade equivalent of 243 CAO points.

All FE applicants will be required to have a full Level 5 award in a programme 'linked' to the Carlow College degree to which they are seeking entry. Details on Linked Programmes are available here: carlowcollege.ie/qqi-fet-linked-programmes

Advanced Entry

QQI applicants who hold a full Level 6 award in a programme directly relevant to the Carlow College programme they wish to apply for, may be accepted for entry to year 2.

Applications are made directly to the Admissions Office and admission will be subject to an interview.

Student Q & A

Why did you choose Carlow College?

I chose to study at Carlow College because it is such a small, tight-knit community. Everybody knows everyone, and the staff make their best efforts to engage with students and try to get to know them. Carlow College is also so central to everything in Carlow Town, and this is a big bonus when it comes to selecting a college to study at.

What do you like most about your chosen course?

I really like the placement element of my course. The reason for this is, it gave me a huge insight into what lies ahead for me if I am to pursue a career in the social care industry. I also feel placement is an essential element of the social care course because social care is such a big area, and placement allows students to gain insight into particular areas in which they may be interested in working. Through placement, students are also gaining hands on experience which they can use on their CV when they are applying for future jobs.

What do you like most about studying at Carlow College?

The thing I liked most about studying at Carlow College was how supportive the lecturers were of students. This was hugely beneficial to me during my years of study because, any time I was struggling with coursework, I always had that bit of reassurance that I could always talk to the lecturer and they would clear things up. This was also a benefit of the lecturers operating an open-door policy where students can always ask to speak to lecturers, and they (the lecturer) will always oblige.

What kind of supports are offered to students?

I have accessed many of the supports available to students at Carlow College. One example is the "Paws Officer" Alfie! Alfie is a therapy dog who I have often met around the grounds of Carlow College and many mornings inside the door of the college as I walk in. Alfie is a great asset to Carlow College and provides great support to students if they are stressed out or simply just want company.

Why would you recommend studying with Carlow College?

I would recommend studying at Carlow College because the staff are so friendly, there are so many supports available to students, and the lecturers know students by their names and show care for them. Students at Carlow College are not just numbers; they are people in the eyes of lecturers and staff. Lecturers, particularly, are very approachable, and throughout my years of study have always operated an open door policy.





A number of scholarships are available to students.

Entrance and Progression scholarships are offered to students across all programmes to recognise academic achievement. These scholarships are awarded automatically, so there is no application required. A monetary prize of €500 is awarded at an awards ceremony each year.

Entrance Scholarships

Academic Achievement Entrance Scholarships are awarded to the student with the highest CAO points on each undergraduate programme.

Progression Scholarships

Each year from first to third year, the student who gains the highest GPA, subject to a minimum of 70%, in each undergraduate programme will be awarded a Progression Scholarship.

Mature Student Entrance Scholarships

Awarded to the mature student with the higher grade point average (GPA) in semester one of each undergraduate programme.
