Module aims and objectives

This module aims to develop learner competencies in broadcast journalism. It advances the overall aims of the programme by providing learners with an opportunity to develop practical skills along with broader knowledge and understanding of this important field in journalism and media.

Module learning outcomes

On completion of this module, learners should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the principles of broadcast news
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the roles and responsibilities of journalists and media practitioners working in broadcast news, including ethical and regulatory considerations
- 3. Apply a range of skills, such as researching, preparing and conducting interviews, gathering stories and scripting and editing (audio/video) news content for broadcast (TV/Radio)
- 4. Develop innovative approaches to broadcast news through knowledge of changing media landscapes and critical self-reflection

Rationale for inclusion of the module in the programme and its contribution to the overall proposed Programme Learning Outcomes

This module is key in developing skills needed for professional work in the news media. The module contributes to the programme learning outcomes by providing learners with the key professional skills to work in broadcast news and media, to be adaptable to new media environments, to approach broadcast journalism in an ethical and responsible way, and to develop the skills such as effective communication, innovation and self-reflection. Assessment of the module provides learners with opportunities to hone their knowledge and understanding of the broadcast media and the skills required in that field.

Information provided to learners about the module

Information on the module will appear in this format in the colleges' prospectus:

This module will give students the chance to develop the key skills used in broadcast journalism. Students will experience what it is to script, shoot, record and present a news/ feature item for broadcast on TV and radio, or digital platforms.

Module content, organisation and structure

Content

Students will focus on the following areas:

- develop a news item for broadcast
- script for news and features items for broadcast
- shoot images to match the script and vice versa
- present PTCs
- edit a news/feature piece
- interview and carry out vox pops

Insight and reflection: Students interrogate their own work and approaches to dealing with the public and the impact their language and image choices have on the objectivity of the story.

Organisation and Structure

The learners will be supported by qualified staff in a practice setting, including industry professionals currently working in journalism. The emphasis will be on experiential learning with students being given short tutorials on how to make a PSC item and then assigned a story to cover. Students will be given stories and a time frame and will have to complete and upload to HEAnet within the time.

Module teaching and learning and assessment strategy

This module relies heavily on PBL. Students are assigned problems and they are required to turn the problem into a news/feature story. The student learns by having the experience of making and crafting the audio/video news item. Students will be assessed on their product and their professional behaviours around the task. The class will view each other's work and give audience feedback. The facilitator also feeds in comments and collates the marks.

Module summative assessment strategy

Learners will be assessed summatively on four news items made over the three weekends. 20% will be awarded for each item and 20% for a reflection on professional behaviours, the challenges and experiences involved in broadcast news production.
