Module aims and objectives

This module gives students the opportunity to write high grade copy and follow their work through to publishing via local news outlets and a campus magazine (two issues) created, edited and published and funded (via advertising) by the group.

Module learning outcomes

On successful completion of this module, the learner should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an ability to source, develop and publish news stories
- 2. Write news stories
- 3. Perform various executive roles and actions in the publishing environment
- 4. Manage workloads, deadlines and post-filing tasks to a high degree
- 5. Reflect on one's own growth and development as a reporter /writer

Rationale for inclusion of the module in the programme and its contribution to the overall proposed Programme Learning Outcomes

This is the cornerstone module of the programme since news reporting and publishing are the most active roles in journalism. In this module, the student further applies their learning and work from the first semester to real world news and publishing sphere.

Information provided to learners about the module

Information on the module will appear in this format in the colleges' prospectus.

This module in Reporting and Publication will give students the opportunity to apply all they have learned in NGR to the real world situation of the newsroom/magazine and online fora. Work will be published and disseminated for wide audiences with the learners performing the specialist roles of the newsrooms such as court reporting, sub editing and acting as editor of news and current affairs stories in a real-time dynamic environment.

Module content, organisation and structure

Content

Students will focus on the following areas:

- Continued news/features and reporting practice following on from NGR
- Performing the journalist roles of producing work and getting it published
- Performing executive roles involved in journalism (editor, manager)
- Ensuring the student magazine/newspaper is published
- Reflect on their own world view in journalism terms

Insight and reflection: Students interrogate their own work and approaches in an honest and reflective way. Students engage with transformative and current research on journalism and its role in society. Students reflect on the changing nature of news and the challenges that lie ahead.

Organisation and Structure

The learners will be supported by qualified staff in a practice setting, including industry professionals currently working in journalism. The emphasis being on the building up of a portfolio of work which showcases the learners' abilities as a journalist. There will be opportunities to write for local newspapers in Carlow, Laois and Kildare where the learners will get real-life experience and see their world published. Students will, as a team, have to create, develop and publish a monthly campus magazine/ newspaper which covers news and feature items.

Module teaching and learning and assessment strategy

The assessment strategy on this module leans on the hegemony of experiential learning in journalism. The best way to become a good writer is to write a lot and often. As a consequence, learners will be assigned regular writing tasks for the express purpose of publishing with a quick turnaround in the H. Dip course magazine (two issues in semester 2).

Module summative assessment strategy

This is a writing, reflection and professional behaviours module and students will be asked to write diverse articles for publication that show flexibility and expertise across genres. Students will be graded on their output and contribution to the successful publication of the student magazine/newspaper.
