Course Description

The MA (Leadership in Therapeutic Child & Social Care) was founded in order to promote fundamental and positive change in social care practice. We continue to believe that care settings that are therapeutic, client-centered and community minded are better and safer for the people we care for. This programme trains qualified staff to work in such settings or bring about changes in their present settings.

The course therefore works as a community of students and staff, a learning space that is oc-operative and not competitive. It can be a safe place for students to explore and get support for personal issues, as well as professional and academic matters.

Who is this course for?

The programme is aimed qualified practitioners in Social Care (and similar professions) who wish to work therapeutically and at a deeper level. We welcome applications from social care practitioners and other experienced professionals who are interested in progressive and therapeutic practice.

Work Placements

Visit of Observation

Students have the unique opportunity to be a participant observer at a work setting of their choice. This allows learners to see and experience how the work setting of their choice works and operates. Students' choice may be informed by their professional interest or the focus of their dissertation. The Visit is undertaken during the summer break between Year 1 and Year 2.

Residential Community Experience

During the course, learners will twice have an opportunity, away from the campus, to experience living together as a community. Course Content

The programme is designed to enhance the learners' knowledge and skills in the use of a variety of therapeutic approaches to the treatment of children and adults who have suffered emotional and psychological hurts. Modules studied include:

- Advanced Therapeutic Child and Social Care 1: Therapeutic Work in Context
- Philosophy and Ehtics of Therapeutic Child and Social Care
- Observing and Understanding Organisational Life (incl. Visit of Observation)
- Experiential Group 1: Leading Self

Year 2

- Advanced Therapeutic Child and Social Care 2: Therapeutic Communication
- Leadership and Management in Therapeutic Child and Social Care
- Experiential Group 2: Leading Self and Others
- Research Methods and Dissertation

Career Opportunities

Graduates of the programme have become Directors of Care, Lecturers in Social Care, and HIQA Inspectors. Some have gone on to research at PhD level and to professional doctorates. Many are content to remain in practice, but work at a deeper and more clinical level. However, many students who arrived on teh course as social care workers soon became team leaders because of the information and kills they were taking back to the workplace.

Entry Requirements

Minimum requirements for this programme are:

1. Hold a primary degree (if experienced) or Honours Bachelor in Applied Social Studies or equivalent*.

2. Be registered or eligible to register as a Professional Social Care Worker** OR

3. Be in employment in a human services agency as a manager, team leader or front-line practitioner

4. Satisfactory pass at interview

*Applicants who do not satisfy the academic criteria may be accepted onto the course if the Course Selection Board is satisfied that they have the ability to complete the course.

** Applications are welcome from those professionally qualified in a discipline other than social care who have at least two years' professional practice experience. Please note: this programme is not a professional award for registration as a Social Care Worker

The programme aims to produce historians who will find, preserve and communicate this history within the academic and public arenas, and gain employment in the fields of heritage, tourism, media and education.

Entry Requirements

Minimum requirements for this programme are:

Hold a primary degree (Level 8) awarded at Second-Class Honours, Grade 2 or equivalent.

Applicants who hold a degree at Level 8 with an award of pass or who hold a degree at Level 7 (or equivalent) may be considered with evidence of relevant career practice for a minimum period of three years or a portfolio of publication in historical or cognate studies. In exceptional circumstances, applicants who do not hold a degree at Level 7 or Level 8 on the NFQ may be considered for entry subject to evidence of relevant career practice for a minimum period of 8 years or who can evidence a substantial portfolio of publication in historical or cognate studies.

All such applications will be subject to the College's Admissions Guidelines and Procedures for the Recognition of Prior Learning.

Carlow College reserves the right to require applicants to attend for interview to determine their suitability for the programme.

Over the course of three/four semesters, students will take seven modules, culminating in the completion of a significant independent research project.

Course Description

The Higher Diploma in Politics & Society programme is a blended learning 60 ECTS programme taken over one year (part-time). It is primarily designed to align with the core senior cycle curriculum to upskill teachers who wish to teach Politics and Society at a secondary level or in the senior cycle. The course also has a broader aim of developing learner awareness of the complementary disciplines of Politics and Society and their practical application in both the classroom and wider community.

Who is this course for?

The programme is aimed at primary and post-primary teachers looking to upskill to teach Politics & Society at secondary level. It is designed in line with the Teaching Council's curricular subject registration requirements for Politics & Society. It is also ideal for those who wish to pursue continuing education in politics and society to enhance career prospectus in the NGO, politics, human rights and advocacy sectors or for professional development for those already working in these sectors

Entry Requirements

Minimum requirements for this programme are:

- 1. Any Level 7 or Level 8 programme in the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. This includes programmes where applicants may have accumulated fewer than 60 ECTS in Politics and/or Society in the course of their degree programme.
- 2.Applicants who have undertaken substantial non-certified learning or CPD in fields directly relevant to Politics and Society may be considered for entry if they can additionally show evidence of relevant career practice for a minimum period of three years, or who can evidence a portfolio of publication (for instance, reports, discussion papers, resource packs) in political, societal or cognate studies.

Course Description

The Higher Diploma in Arts in Journalism & New Media Content was co-designed and is delivered in partnership with South East Technological University (SETU) Carlow. It is a programme designed to attract, train and educate those who wish to have careers as writers in the cognate fields of journalism, content creation, media and communications; anywhere where precision and facts are vital to the success and empowerment of employers, audiences and democracy.

The programme is also aimed at those already working in media and journalism who might want to engage with deeper views and new methods to improve and expand their practice. Each module is designed to provide a comprehensive education and training in the skills, competencies and knowledge needed to become a journalist and/or media content creator.

Students will learn to construct stories factually, engagingly, and appropriately for different media platforms and audiences. Students will go beyond the mere training needed to write accurately in the journalistic mode and further their practice by engaging with advanced academic work to unveil deeper knowledge about the theory and practice of journalism and media writing.



Who is this course for?

The programme is aimed at those already working in media and journalism who might want gain a formal qualification or to engage with deeper views and new methods to improve and expand their practice. It is also ideal for those looking to start their career in journalism or media content creation.

Entry Requirements

All applicants will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Applicants who do not have a Level 8 qualification at a 2.2 award level and who have relevant work experience and or other certificates and qualifications may also be considered through the Institute's RPL procedures. Relevant professional experience may be considered and individuals will be assessed on a case-by-case basis through RPL procedures.

SETU reserves the right to require applicants to attend for interview programme.

- News Gathering and Reporting
- Feature Writing
- Media Law, Values and Ethics
- Media Entrepreneurship
- Reporting and Publication
- Broadcasting
- Digital Journalism and Storytelling

Career Opportunities

It is recognised that the journalism and media landscape is undergoing enormous changes and that traditional content, consumers and modes of production are evolving rapidly. The structure and content of this programme recognizes the need to prepare graduates for these challenges. The ability to reflect on one's own practice is a core element of many modules.

What is this course about?

The Certificate in Creative Writing (Fiction) aims to introduce learners to different writing disciplines and styles and encourage them to experiment with them. It will also require them to develop their skills as critics through the close reading of other writers work and their own and fellow learners' writing and texts.

Entry Requirements

Applicants must be resident in Ireland and at least 18 years old at course commencement, in accordance with Carlow College Admission Guidelines and Procedures for Part-Time Learners.

What will be covered?

Over the course of the Certificate, learners will analyse and practice various modes of fiction writing.

- The course will cover aspects of fiction such as: the creative process; some techniques; keeping a writer's notebook
- Writing what you know, what you do know, what you think you know and what you think you don't know
- character
- Story setting
- Story structure: story, plot, action, time
- Narrative point of view and narration
- Showing and telling
- Editing for digital platforms
- Development of writer's portfolio

Each theme will be explored and developed through individual and group exercises in class, and at home in Learner's writing workbook

What is this course about?

The Certificate in Creative Writing (Fiction) aims to introduce learners to different writing disciplines and styles and encourage them to experiment with them. It will also require them to develop their skills as critics through the close reading of other writers work and their own and fellow learners' writing and texts.

Entry Requirements

Applicants must be resident in Ireland and at least 18 years old at course commencement, in accordance with Carlow College Admission Guidelines and Procedures for Part-Time Learners.

What will be covered?

Learners will cover the following areas:

- Contemporary poetry
- Poems about family
- Poetic voice, and the importance of the aural to poetry as an art the music of poetry.
- Poems about objects
- Ekphrastic poetry, poetry responding to art
- Poems in translation
- Prose poetry, satire, the dramatic monologue, metaphor, simile and symbol
- The sonnet, the sestina and villanelle, for example.
- Writing for digital platforms

Learning how to submit a number of their poems to magazines for consideration for publication in the course of this module.

The Certificate in Creativity & Social Media aims to provide the learner with an understanding of the role and importance of creativity and innovation as an effective tool in social, political and community development. It surveys the most influential and effective social media platforms from local, national and international perspectives. The primary objective of this course is to enable learners to develop the knowledge and competence to creatively engage with online communities and to critically analyse the use and potential of social media in social, political and community contexts.

Learners will gain an understanding of creativity and social media theory and knowledge, as well as develop practical skills to enable the application of their learning to the virtual environment.

Entry Requirements

Applicants must be resident in Ireland and at least 18 years old at course commencement, in accordance with Carlow College Admission Guidelines and Procedures for Part-Time Learners.

What will be covered?

The course will cover the following areas:

- Theoretical Perspectives on Media
- Contemporary and New Media
- Critical Media Literacy
- Digital Media Skills: curation and maintenance of online presence and familiarisation with key website builders and domain management.
- Media Analysis and Research Methods

Each theme will be explored and developed through individual and group exercises in class, and at home in Learner's writing workbook.

What is this course about?

The Certificate in Cultural Heritage aims to enable learners to engage in profound and multifaceted discussion and analysis about cultural heritage from both a theoretical and practical perspective. Learners on the programme will explore an awareness of regional cultural heritage and the importance of heritage in Ireland. The main goal is to enable learners to understand the concept of cultural heritage and to apply this knowledge to current and possible future projects. Learners will examine the tangible and intangible or nonphysical aspects of regional culture.

This programme also examines the processes of remembering the past by taking a case study approach to assess the ways in which heritage has been used politically, at regional, local and community level and by interest groups. Issues surrounding cultural heritage such as protection, repatriation, destruction and cultural property law will be analysed. A critical appraisal of how cultural heritage institutions use digital media, focusing on the relationship between material and digital objects, the impact of technology, and virtual heritage possibilities.

On-site: 8% | Synchronous online: 92%. There will be one on-campus workshop over the 12 weeks

Entry Requirements

Applicants are required to hold:

• Any Level 7 History or a cognate subject, OR Demonstration of a record of being employed in the field of history in some way, OR Evidence of publication in history in a good local historical journal.

What will be covered?

The major topics of this programme will include:

- Defining cultural heritage based on current scholarship.
- Exploring people's experience and understanding of their personal, national, regional and local pasts.
- Interrogating and analysing different understandings of the past.
- An analysis and debate of the issues surrounding cultural heritage such as protection, repatriation, destruction and cultural property law.
- The use of new media in the service of cultural heritage.
- The relationship between material and digital objects in cultural heritage collections.

What is this course about?

The Certificate in Oral History enables learners to practice oral history in a competent, methodologically robust and ethically sound way. It aims to introduce them to uses of oral history in museum and heritage settings, and to learn basic podcasting skills. The programme develops the methodology of collecting 'history from below', giving learners the skills to collect and interpret evidence that is not available in the written record. It enables learners to learn best practice standards in oral history methodologies. The programme has a special emphasis on developing oral history interview techniques and competencies, digital competencies and knowledge of ethical considerations that are vital to the ethical conduct of oral history.

Entry Requirements

Applicants are required to hold:

- Any Level 7 History or a cognate subject, OR
- Demonstration of a record of being employed in the field of history in some way, OR
- Evidence of publication in history in a good local historical journal.

Carlow College, St. Patrick's reserves the right to require applicants to attend for an interview to determine their suitability for the course.

What will be covered?

This programme covers the following areas:

- Methodological and ethical approach to the collection,
- subsequent use and archiving of oral history,
- Key resources for best practice of oral history
- Ethics in the oral history process
- Interviewing skills and recording skills.
- Techniques to transcribe interviews, and to edit recordings.
- Analysing interviews, using other sources to check veracity.
- Podcasting.
- Developments in the digitisation of oral history, enabling wider use of oral history in websites, museum and other heritage settings

What is this course about?

The Certificate in Citizenship, Identity and Belonging aims to provide learners with an introduction to citizenship, which has become one of the most political ideas of our time. This course explores the process of politics and active citizenship, and creative involvement in political life whether at a community, national or global level. The course will also critically engage with the politics of citizenship, including the issues of membership, inclusion, and exclusion with reference to theoretical perspectives on nationalism, identity, and cultural conflict.

Mode of Delivery

On-site: 8% | Synchronous online: 92% There will be one on-campus workshop over the 12 weeks.

Entry Requirements

The Certificate in Colonialism, Development and Globalisation provides learners with a historical awareness of the conditions of power under which scholarly knowledge and dominant development discourse has been produced, by introducing postcolonial and post development theories and practices and interrogating how our own institutional context is shaped by the complexities of Ireland's relation to empire and capitalism, past and present.

The course aims to introduce learners to the key issues and ideas in international development and examines the historical context, economic and political basis of colonialism and development. The course also aims to critically evaluate development theoretical frameworks and practices. The Certificate in Contemporary Politics and Public Policy aims to explore the way that public policy shapes our lives and the different forms that politics takes. It addresses a variety of ways of thinking about politics and provides some of the key concepts and analytical frameworks used in analysing politics. This includes examining the practices involved in organizing public life, regulating who gets involved in decision-making and on what terms, and shaping how much influence they get to have over those decisions, whether at local, national or transnational level.

A distinctive feature of this course is its applied nature. As part of developing learner's skills in undertaking political and policy research, this module also focuses on building critical media literacy skills that facilitate learners' active engagement in current affairs. The course provides the opportunity to develop learner capacity for rigorous oral and written argument. Learners will have an opportunity to carry out research into political life, developing analytical and debating skills.

The Certificate in International Human Rights aims to introduce learners to the key theories, concepts, and frameworks of analysis of Human Rights theory. It will introduce learners to human rights instruments, including International Human Rights Articles, Declarations and Conventions on Human Rights with reference to empirical case studies. The course aims to foster analytic and critical thinking skills, and the ability to formulate independent coherent arguments through problem posing methods using a Rights-based perspective.

International Human Rights offers a lens to analyse complex global issues such as colonialism and development learners. Learners will be able to demonstrate advanced written, oral, presentation and digital skills as part of and to be able to conduct qualitative and quantitative analysis and critically analyse of how evidence and data are used to support arguments.

The Certificate in Political Philosophy aims to provide learners with an overview of the classic topics in political philosophy and the major thinkers in the western political tradition, and support learners to examine the influence of these philosophical concepts influence on contemporary political structures. It also aims to deepen learner understanding of the links between into social, scientific, and philosophical subjects.

This course is divided into two parts. The first part examines classic topics in political philosophy, from the historical figures in Greek philosophy to social contract theories of Thomas Hobbes, John Locke, and Jean-Jacques Rousseau, as well as key critiques. The second part of the course will explore issues within contemporary political philosophy, such as equality, human rights, and the politics of immigration with reference to contemporary case studies.

The Certificate in Pegagogy for Politics and Society facilitates learner engagement with the theoretical and practical aspects of teaching Politics and Society for Leaving Cert. The course is designed in line with the teaching and learning strategy outlined in the Politics and Society Curriculum Specifications.

The course content engages with pedagogical approaches to teaching Politics and Society and facilitatse a Freirean approach to critically exploring the theories and processes that underpin differing conceptions of the Politics and Society syllabus. The Certificate in World Religions, Peace and Conflict aims at developing the learners' interpretative skills and cultivating insights into how to do Christian theology in today's pluralist world. In that, the course will introduce learners to the key belief systems, worldviews, truth claims, rituals, scriptures, etc. of Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam and Judaism. Learners will be equipped with conceptual and practical skills in interfaith dialogue that are needed as a good citizen with the aim of promoting peaceful co-existence, mutual enrichment and common witness among the various traditions in a pluralist society.

Applicants must be resident in Ireland and at least 18 years old at course commencement, in accordance with Carlow College Admission Guidelines and Procedures for Part-Time Learners



What will be covered?

Topics covered in the course include:

- The three phases of progression of major religious traditions
- Analysis of scriptures of world religions and their specific historical, geographical and soteriological contexts Various interfaith initiatives of the churches and other religious traditions
- A critical evaluation of religion's role in violence and peace by engaging with various theoretical positions
- Identification of the historical trajectories of interpretations of religious traditions either to support war or peace.
- A critical analysis of various fundamentalist forms of religions and their relationship with the political field.
- An analysis of how the intersection between faith and reason has promoted non-violence and just-peace in the world



Will I have access to Carlow College campus and facilities?

Yes, as an online student you will be registered as an Carlow College student with access to the same facilities as a full-time student, including the library, student supports and health and well being services. Full details about services available to students is on our Student Portal.

Will I need to attend the Carlow College campus?

Where your course is listed as "blended" delivery, there will be an on-campus component, such as a workshop or similar, and students are strongly encouraged to attend.

How many hours a week do I need to commit to lectures, study and assignments?

Our Certificate courses have about 3 hours of live lectures per week. The rest of your study time consists of independent learning, communicating with your lecturers and classmates and carrying out assignments.

For Higher Diplomas, online lectures are two evenings per week (3 hours each) and then every second Saturday (4 hours).

Live lectures normally take place between 6.30pm and 9.30pm, Monday to Thursday but this may vary depending on the availability of specific lecturers. If the scheduled times for the live online lectures do not suit you, recordings are generally not available.

How are blended courses assessed?

Students are generally assessed through continuous assessments for online courses. The methods of assessment can be found on the module links on the course web pages on our website.

Can my employer fund a part-time blended course?

Yes. If your employer is part- or fully-funding your studies, you should contact the Admissions Office by emailing directentry@carlowcollege.ie

Our Admissions team will supply a proforma invoice which your employer will need to arrange payment for.

What equipment is needed for online lectures?

Students will need to have access to a PC that is connected to the internet. The PC must have speakers and access to a web camera is beneficial for engaging with lecturers and peers.

Many students opt to use headphones for listening to live lectures, but this is optional.

Your PC or laptop should have a minimum operating system of Windows 10 or equivalent.

For a smooth Microsoft Teams experience, a minimum of 1.5 Mbps download and 1.5 Mbps upload speed is recommended for one-on-one calls. For group video calls, aim for at least 4 Mbps download and upload speeds. You can check complete a Internet Speed Test here.

Postgraduate Applications

Applications for postgraduate courses are to be made online at carlowcollege.ie/postgraduate-applications

For postgraduate courses, you will need to collate the following documents for your application:

- Official transcripts for all Level 8 (or above) qualifications held
- Official certificates/documentation in relation to education/training completed which is relevant to the programme
- Personal Statement-minimum 300 words outlining your reasons for undertaking the chosen course.
- Written reference outlining your suitability for the programme applied for Intellectual qualities, including; professional and educational developments; present performance; personal qualities; career aspirations; and, research/study interests.
- If English is not your first language, you'll need to provide proof of English Language Proficiency

For Certificate courses, in most cases, you will only need to submit a Personal Statement as part of your application, with the exception of History certificates.

For Certificate courses in History, applicants must provide evidence of:

Demonstration of a record of being employed in the field of history in some way, OR Evidence of publication in history in a good local historical journal.
