7.3 Indicative Module Content, Organisation and Structure

Learners complete an 8,000-10,000-word dissertation. To promote learners' research skills, they build on the work completed in semester one where they will have identified a research topic of their own choice in social care and related fields and developed a Research Proposal on this topic. They now 'locate' it within the relevant literature and develop an appropriate ethically sound methodological approach. Their task will be to gather and analyse empirical data in their chosen dissertation topic and present their final thesis.

The module supports the learners' research journey through the following elements in classroom sessions. Each learner will also be allocated a supervisor.

- Developing a Research Question
- Preparing a Literature Review
- Applying Methodology; approaches to data collection
- Demonstrating Research Ethics
- Fieldwork Doing the Research; Sampling, questionnaires and the interview process
- Presenting and analysing data
- Writing up
- Present the final thesis
